They're dusting off their holiday decor five months early for Scranton Tomorrow's fifth annual Christmas in July.

Scranton Tomorrow, downtown's community and economic development organization, is recruiting local businesses to offer promotions that run from Thursday, July 25, through Sunday, July 28.

"We provide the platform," said Scranton Tomorrow's Liz Baldi, who coordinates the event. "Then we give them the freedom to make it their own."

Bars and restaurants typically roll out holiday menus and serve up seasonal drinks they've kept on ice since December.

Shops will decorate for Christmas and offer daily deals. They'll announce specifics on their individual Facebook pages, and on Scranton Tomorrow's page.

Tammy's Stained Glass Treasures, a 3-year-old stained and fused glass studio and shop on Adams Avenue, is joining the premature holiday revelry for the first time this year.

Owner Tammy Pilger will have a sidewalk sale all weekend with 20% off Christmas decor and other daily specials, including discounts on classes, a free \$5 gift certificate with the purchase of a \$25 gift certificate on Friday, and 20% off all gift shop sales on Sunday.

"It spreads the word for everybody, plus it's free advertising, so that's fabulous," Pilger said.
